A Year in Review

Message from the Chair of the Board

Dear FNMPMC Members:

2021 has been a year of achievement and growth for FNMPMC. As I reflect on all we have done, I am proud of our accomplishments. Core to our mandate, FNMPMC continues to support our member communities across the country with capacity support, tool, and advice to make informed business decisions. These services are provided in a manner that enables and lifts up community involvement from Chief and Council to Elders and Youth.

What we are striving for in our service delivery is a sharing of knowledge from our technicians to those in the community who have to make decisions concerning economic development and environmental protection. Through some of our programs, such as the training on federal impact assessment, we see this knowledge sharing happening in real-time.

During 2021, FNMPMC has undertaken strategic planning to produce a 5-year plan. This 5-year plan is the first in our organizational history and has enabled us to establish a long-term vision based on the priorities of our members across the country. Within the 5-year plan we are focused on the expansion of our service delivery to our members. Throughout this year, we have been running two pilot projects that we hope will become permanent service offerings within FNMPMC.

- » The first pilot has been focused on providing land and resource planning tools to hereditary leadership. We have undertaken these efforts in collaboration with the Gitxsan Watersheds to assist them with an inventory of lands and protected areas.
- » The second pilot with our BC members has focused on providing land management services such as help with Additions to Reserve (ATR), lease assignments, and other land management services normally provided through ISC. The pilot is demonstrating that First Nation-led organizations can help deliver services normally provided by ISC in a more efficient and effective manner.

On the project development front, FNMPMC continues to help our members advance their projects. 2022 will be a year of project advancements with major announcements planned around the CGL equity acquisition by 13 of our member communities, the furthering of the Tu-Deh-Kah Geothermal and Ne Too Hydropower Projects, and the Chatham – Kent to Lakeshore Transmission equity acquisition with our members in Ontario.

Further in this update, our team has listed our top highlights from 2021. On behalf of our board of directors, I want to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support of FNMPMC. I want to wish you a safe and happy holiday season.

In addition to the creation of our new logo, the FNMPc worked with young Indigenous videographer, Nolan McAllister, to produce a stunning video showcasing our members and the incredible work happening in their territories as supported by the Coalition.



In June 2021, the FNMPc released its *Roadmap to Investing in Canada: Indigenous Inclusion in ESG* report which featured unprecedented thought leadership from private sector, public sector, and Indigenous nations. The report and associated Top 10 list summarized outcomes from the our Indigenous Sustainable Investment Conference which was attended by over 1,500 participants.



In 2020, FNMP received a multi-year funding agreement which allowed the organization to undertake a long-term planning exercise on the eve of our fifth anniversary of operations.
